

African Swine Fever

African Swine Fever (ASF) is a viral disease that is highly contagious among domestic and feral swine of all types and ages. Areas that are currently struggling with outbreaks are China, Africa, Europe, Taiwan and other parts of Asia.



You are not at risk.

African Swine Fever is **NOT** a risk to public health. It is only contagious among pigs, so it can *not* be transferred to humans. Countries affected by ASF have had no human illnesses from the disease.




Pork is safe to eat.

Pork from pigs with African Swine Fever is safe to eat. To reduce the chance of it entering the U.S., the USDA does not allow pork from countries with confirmed cases of ASF to be imported into the United States.



International Travel Tips

When traveling abroad, **do not** bring pork products back into the United States, and do not visit any swine farm within five days after you return.



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
